An article entitled "Never the Same," in the latest issue of THF's award-winning Texas HERITAGE magazine, highlights the impact that World War II and the building of Camp Swift, an Army training center erected near Bastrop,had on the small town.

Construction projects within the facility included 2,750 buildings, a regional hospital, a post office, and a telephone exchange. At its peak, construction and operations provided 18,000 jobs.
