1954-2019 THF Celebrates 65 Years of Preserving the Icons of the Lone Star Past



Alamo Grant Highlights THF Legacy of Giving

As the Texas Historical Foundation celebrates 65 years of funding preservation projects in 2019, a gift of \$21,000 to the Alamo Trust, Inc., presented by several Foundation directors, highlighted that accomplishment. The grant was used to assist with the conservation of seven original cannons from the historic 1836 battle.

The restoration project is now complete, and the cannons have been returned to the Alamo. Displayed vertically, in order to prevent debris from accumulating in the bore, the cannons are located in the arches of the arcade away from direct sunlight.

THF President Bruce Elsom said, "Even though it's been 183 years since these cannons fired their last shots, they are precious artifacts that help tell the story of Texas independence. Our Foundation is especially proud to be part of the work that helped preserve and protect these relics so that generations of visitors can see them and understand their role in Lone Star history."



New Endowment for the Arts Already Making an Impact

As a long-time THF director, Bill Sibley, of San Antonio, had listened to many grant proposals during the years. He noticed that because of funding issues, applications for arts-related projects were often turned down in favor of more traditional bricks-and-mortar work.

An author and playwright, Sibley found himself in a position to help broaden the Foundation's giving by creating an endowment through THF to support art-related projects. He established the William Jack Sibley Arts Endowment in January 2019, and the first recipient of a gift from that fund was Montopolis Productions, an Austin multi-media company.
